# Student-Board and Student Principal's Council



# CHARTER INFUSION

Infusion of Charter into expected
Alberta curricular outcomes. Ex. the
garden can be used to teach students

- Cartesian planes- integral ordered pairs and transferring positions
- Heritability in plants (ex. corn kernel protein)
- Role of market systems in society (supply and demand)

# **OPTIONS**

Option courses that will be offered have been determined based upon student interest. Sports, foods, and woodworking options have been communicated as most desired by students with an overwhelming majority.

- Option courses that do not have an Alberta approved program of studies will need a locally developed course proposal submitted to the board for approval (expected to be completed for the end of July)
- Option courses tentatively scheduled to be offered throughout the year include:
  - Sports (potential combinations of soccer, basketball, volleyball, badminton, flag football, cross country, etc.)
  - Foods (introductory course into food and meal preparation)
  - Leatherworking/ blacksmithing (artistic license to learn and create unique products with leather and steel)
  - Woodworking (introductory course into woodworking basics)
  - Ranch Skills (intended to advance knowledge on basic ranch skills- halter breaking, roping, herd management)
  - Winter Sports (embracing Alberta's climate by taking part in outdoor winter activities)
  - Photography (introductory course into photography basics)
  - Outdoor Education (introductory and integrated course to teach outdoor skills and promote stewardship)
  - Back to the Basics (introductory course designed to teach basic life and homesteading skills)
- Option course synopses will be included for each course, providing students with a brief overview of what the program will look like, things you will learn, projects that will be completed, community partnerships, associated fees\*, etc. (\*assistance is available for families experiencing financial hardship)
- Option course selection will be based on a first come first served model\* and will be sent to BOTH parent and student emails in mid August. (\*Every consideration will be given to those students who did not get their first choice in one term/ trimester for the subsequent one)

# **CHORES**

Collaborative effort with elementary students Chores are completed

- twice a day- morning and afternoon
- expectations for students participating in chores is to ensure that school work continues to be completed- chore program agreements are signed by students and parents

Junior High student specific chores will include

- daily care of the turkeys and market hogs
- data collection from chore managers and recording



# STUDENT EMAILS

Student emails will be created and communicated at the beginning of August. Access information will be sent to the parents for students. Test emails will be sent to ensure emails are working properly. Please have your child respond to the test emails as instructed! # **CHARTER OPTION COURSE**

#### What is it?

- An opportunity for junior high students to have autonomy in their education- student led research with teacher guidance
- Students choose an area of interest to focus on and complete longitudinal, project-based learning upon ex. weight gain with steers

#### When will this be offered?

- Year-round: 4 blocks/ week (4 hours)
- This means 156 blocks of the year (approx.) are spent learning what and how you want!

## Thinking points!

- WHY did you choose the topic? What interests you about it? Ensure your topic is manageable and realistic.
- **WHO** could use the information gathered by your research? Do you know of organizations or institutions affiliated with the topic?
- WHAT are the major questions for this topic? Is there a debate about the topic? Are there a range of issues and viewpoints to consider?
- WHERE is your topic important: at the local, national or international level? Are there specific places affected by the topic?
- WHEN is/was your topic important? Is it a current or historical issue? Do you want to compare your topic by time periods?
- HOW can the results of your topic research be used for future improvement?
